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A HISTORIC AND CONTINUING REFORMATION

On Oct. 31, 1517, an outspoken university professor and Augustinian monk named Martin Luther posted a list of objections to the Roman Catholic system of beliefs and practices of his time. Chief among his grievances was the church's claim that Christians could buy their way out of punishment for sin and thus shorten their time in purgatory by purchasing a letter of "indulgence" from their local parish. In practice, much of the money went into the pockets of corrupt local princes.

Whether Luther nailed his "95 Theses" to the door of his hometown church, as legend has it, or simply mailed it to his archbishop, Luther's act represented a stunning challenge to papal authority and the Holy Roman Empire.

The split that followed, known as the Protestant Reformation, fostered the development of religious and political freedoms in Europe, but also set the stage for persecution and war. Catholic-Protestant hatred and persecution endured for centuries.

In our modern era, the Lutheran and Roman Catholic traditions have achieved at least a partial reconciliation. Many of the issues that Martin Luther highlighted have since been addressed by Roman Catholic leaders.

"True Christians," <u>Luther wrote</u>, "participate in all the blessings of Christ and the church, and this is granted to them by God even without indulgence letters." (Thesis 37) Such letters,

he wrote, "are nets with which one fishes for the wealth of people." (Thesis 66). In 1567, Pope Pius V abolished the sale of indulgences.

Other theological issues, however, were not so easily resolved.

Luther had objected to the Catholic teaching that one could attain salvation through his or her own efforts, arguing instead that salvation was a gift freely given, bestowed upon all those who have faith and accept God's grace. That doctrine, which was known as "justification by grace," was resisted until the Vatican II Council largely accepted it in the 1960s.

Roman Catholics have also accepted other arguments posed by Luther, including his belief that people should be able to worship and read the Bible in their own language and participate freely in the Eucharist, a privilege restricted to the clergy in Luther's time.

However, on other issues, such as the authority of the pope and his bishops, the role of women in the church and same-sex marriage, significant differences remain.

Let us pray that our dialogue with Roman Catholic church leaders will continue to bring us together into a closer relationship with them and that our relationships with leaders of all Christian denominations will grow to bear much fruit for the sake of the Gospel.

STIC NEWS

Having brought home church altar flowers, I noticed that when the flowers were spent and ready to be strewn on our lawn, there was, of course the green foam which helps hold the stems securely, but underneath that was also a filmy cluster of very small white plastic bits. Without a thought, they went flying across the grass as I dumped the water. They were there for days. When bits like this get into our streams and water, there are no known 'nets' fine enough to catch the miniscule ones, and this is a mounting problem in all of our waters. This material is probably in most cut flower arrangements. So, I've changed my pattern, casting out the flowers, but straining the water as much as possible, then securing it all in a tied trash bag to prevent loose matter. Only an ounce of prevention, but faithful in little, faithful in much, and every drop counts!

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED


Our congregation, like many other churches and organizations in our area, provides volunteers during certain months of the year to help put together food boxes and distribute them to needy families through our local Food Panty.

ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

You may know St. Francis of Assisi only as the sweet saint who adorns birdbaths and whose statues can be found in gardens all over the world. But he was much more than that.

He was a rich and spoiled young man who was born in 1182 in Assisi, Italy. He died in 1226 outside of Assisi next to the church of St. Mary of the Angels where he and his followers, lived lives of poverty and ministered to the lepers who lived nearby.

As St. Thomas More is "a man for all seasons," St. Francis of Assisi is a man for all ages, one who became so light and airy, so free of all possessiveness and selfishness that multitudes of men and women followed in his footsteps. Even animals listened to him. And when he died at twilight on October 4, 1226, the larks rose up to the roof of his cell and circled it with wing beat and song. —Murray Bodo, OFM

These are some words from the writings of St. Francis of Assisi:

Remember the words of our Lord, "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you." (Mt. 5: 44).

Lord, King of heaven and earth, we give you thanks for yourself. Of your own holy will you created all things spiritual and physical, made us in your own image and likeness, and gave us a place in paradise, through your only Son, in the Holy Spirit.

We are all poor sinners and unworthy even to mention your name, and so we beg our Lord Jesus Christ, your beloved Son, in whom you are well pleased, and the Holy Spirit, to give you thanks for everything.

I say to you, my friends: We must all be on our guard against pride and empty boasting and beware of worldly or natural wisdom. A worldly spirit loves to talk a lot but do nothing, striving for the exterior signs of holiness that people can see, with no desire for true piety and interior holiness of spirit.

Humility, patience, perfect simplicity, and true peace of heart are all its aim, but above everything else it desires the fear of God, the divine wisdom and the divine love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

When we see or hear people speaking or doing evil or blaspheming God, we must say and do good, praising God, who is blessed forever.
