PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The Growing Tree Learning & Daycare located in Reidler Hall is scheduled to close no later than Friday, August 23, 2024, "due to financial challenges."

Our Council was shocked at this unexpected news. They had not known that the Growing Tree was having problems until the operator told them that she didn't want to continue to lease our property any longer.

The closing of the Growing Tree is a great loss to the families in and around Orwigsburg. There simply are not enough daycare centers in our area. But the closing of the Growing Tree is also a loss to our congregation's financial health and our on-going ministry.

This closure will mean that our congregation will lose as much as \$7,000 of income this year, and that we may need to find as much as \$24,000 in new income next year.

Unfortunately, to this point, no one has agreed to lease our property later this year to operate a daycare or for any other purpose.

Our Council has already met to discuss this situation and will continue to look for ways to deal with this unexpected problem.

Our Finance Committee will also meet to discuss our current financial situation, even as they are beginning to craft a proposed budget for the upcoming year.

If you have ideas which may help in the near term or as we look towards 2025, please share them with members of our Council or our Finance Committee.

If you can contribute a bit more to our ministry and mission this year, you are encouraged to do so. Your kindness and generosity will surely be rewarded.

37^{TH.} NEPA SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The 37th. Synod Assembly was held Saturday June 8, 2024, at Atonement Lutheran Church in Wyomissing. Participants were able to attend in person or by Zoom Meeting (I attended by Zoom). The theme for the assembly was: "Hungry for Life Together in Christ" with special attention to their 50-year partnership in ELCA World Hunger.

Prior to June 8, participants attended 3 on-line sessions to prepare for the assembly. These sessions included information about synod business (such as budget, elections, etc.) and resolutions that were voted on during the assembly. Also, during these sessions, stories of activities/projects happening in our synod were shown. Mentioned too was the announcement that the synod is preparing a workshop for church secretaries and treasurers to help them in their roles in their churches.

The assembly opened with a worship service with Bishop deForest presiding and preaching. John 6:1-14 was the basis of his sermon asking "Who is hungry" in this story of the feeding of the five thousand? People hunger for Jesus to help change their lives. Jesus hungers for us to "get it". Christ can and will feed us. Bishop deForest said that he thought the reference to the "12 baskets of food that was left over" was to remind us that all the fragments were gathered so that nothing is lost. We are followers of Christ, the one who wants to feed everyone. Christ is the bread of life.

The business of the synod followed the worship service. Pastor Samantha Drennan spoke about the resolution concerning the synod land acknowledge statement (copy on bulletin board in gathering room). Voting for synod council members and 2025 church wide assembly representatives was conducted.

Charlotte Gross spoke about our "God's Work, Our Hands" (celebrating 10 years) on-going program emphasizing the theme of fighting world hunger. The ELCA World Hunger efforts are taking place in 64 countries. Pastor Eileen Smith-Levan also addressed the hunger theme. She reminded us of the June 22 Hunger Walk being held at Conrad Weiser Middle School. ELCA representative, Marie Sliwinski, addressed the assembly as a Senior Director of the "Building Resilient Communities".

Four resolutions were presented and adopted during the assembly. Resolution S7.28 gives "voice and vote" to Licensed Lay Ministers. Dr. Donald Boyer presented the budget as well as explaining plans/ideas for re-structuring the synods' finances. The budget for 2025 was approved.

The 2025 Synod Assembly will be held May 30 and 31, 2025, with location to be announced.

Also, Bishop deForest's verbal report will be found on the same site (he did not give his verbal report at the assembly due to time restraints – his written report is found on the website). FROM AN ARTICLE BY DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. ON EDUCATION

It seems to me that education has a two-fold function to perform in the life of man and in society: the one is utility and the other is culture. Education must enable a man to become more efficient, to achieve with increasing facility the legitimate goals of his life.

Education must also train one for quick, resolute and effective thinking. To think incisively and to think for one's self is very difficult. We are prone to let our mental life become invaded by legions of half-truths, prejudices, and propaganda. At this point, I often wonder whether or not education is fulfilling its purpose.

A great majority of the so-called educated people do not think logically and scientifically. Even the press, the classroom, the platform, and the pulpit in many instances do not give us objective and unbiased truths. To save man from the morass of propaganda, in my opinion, is one of the chief aims of education. Education must enable one to sift and weigh evidence, to discern the true from the false, the real from the unreal, and the facts from the fiction.

The function of education, therefore, is to teach one to think intensively and to think critically. But education which stops with efficiency may prove the greatest menace to society. The most dangerous criminal may be the man gifted with reason, but with no morals.

We must remember that intelligence is not enough. Intelligence plus character—that is the goal of true education.
